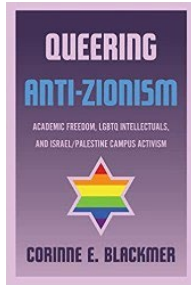
Noa Tishby’s “Israel: A Simple Guide to the Most Misunderstood Country on Earth,” offers accessible talking points on key issues around Israel.



Ari Shavit, a journalist offers in “My Promised Land,” what is called by all accounts an even handed report of the state of threats against Israel.



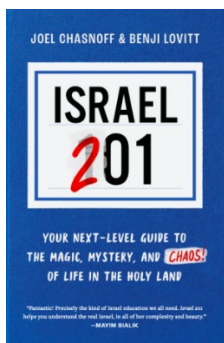
